Robin's Safety Corner - Distracted

It's happened to all of us, were in a middle of a task, the cell phone rings, someone walks up to say hi or ask what we're doing and the chain of what we are trying to accomplish gets broken. If the task is menial like raking the leaves or taking out the trash, the consequences of doing the task might be just having to do the task over. But what if your in the middle of your preflight, working on your aircraft or performing a duty in the cockpit, the results could be disastrous.

Distractions could also be in the form of learning new equipment. Just recently I was working with a customer that had a glass panel installed in an aircraft that he has owned for a number of years. Even though he studied the manuals diligently, his first few flights were overwhelming for him. On one take off while getting ready to taxi on to the runway, the engine monitoring system flashed a caution message that changed his concentration path. Immediately he started to focus on the message and almost pulled onto the runway in front of an aircraft on final. The results could of had dire consequences.

Cell phone usage and the use of personal electronic devices has had an increased effect in the cause of aviation accidents and incidents as well. The NTSB in its investigation of these problems has issued many safety recommendations dealing with use of These devises. Some of these recommendations called on the FAA to prohibit airline crew members from using PEDs for nonoperational use while at their duty station on the flight deck, while the aircraft is being operated or intended to be operated. Other recommendations said the FAA should require Parts 121 (air carrier), 135 and 91 Subpart K operators to inform pilots during initial and recurrent training of the "detrimental effects" associated with nonoperational use of PEDs, and ensure that their procedures prohibit nonoperational use of PEDs by operational personnel during flight and safety-critical periods and also during critical ground activities" such as flight planning and preflight inspection.

Flying here at Independence has an increased risk for distractions simply due to our environment and the basic reasons why we live and fly here, it is low key, fun and there are great people to be around. With our open ramps and taxi-ways, it's easy to wander around and see what's going on. Our friendliness, natural curiosities and thirst for knowledge prompts us to say greetings and ask questions. But sometimes our timing might not be quite right and we might actually be breaking the chain of a critical task. Many times at the fuel pumps I've watched someone fueling an aircraft getting distracted by a curious by-passer only to forget putting on their fuel caps. I've seen a few instances of pilots taxing out with the tow bar still attached!

So the next time your at an airport and are curious to what someone is doing or just want to say a friendly hi, just take a second and ask yourself if maybe you should delay a few seconds to let them finish their task.


