He also talked about the use of turbine engines in experimental aircraft and the use of appropriate tiewraps. Panduit Corp makes high temp (500 F[o1]) wraps. These wraps run just under a \$1 each. Also the <u>red</u> Adel clamps are for high temperature use. Do not tie-wrap directly to a motor mount, it must have a stand-off.


Outreach – The chapter hosted 22 second grade students from a Dallas charter school in a tour of the airport and chapter building in May. The kids got an introduction to what makes an airplane fly, played with the wind tunnel, made a paper airplane and then, after Jerry Pryce brought over an Ercoupe for the kids, got to sit in a real flying machine. The weather was cooperative and the kids got to watch planes come and go, eat their lunch in the sun and make airplane sounds when sitting in the Ercoupe. All the kids took information home with them about the Young Eagle Rally so we might see a bunch of new fliers in June. He attended a Teen Aviation Weekend and later joined the Teen Builders, drilled holes and pulled rivets on the Zenith 701. He discovered he liked the hands on feeling of making things and his interest shifted from academic to technical pursuits. Trevor is graduating in Dallas



and after spending the summer working to pay for all this excitement, will be entering a local community college to learn the trade of being an electrician. Yep, he is going to be a "sparky" guy, making sure the electrons, volts and amps all go where they are supposed to go and do what they are supposed to do. Best of luck, Trevor!
