Many of you are familiar with the phrase "B2B" or "Business-to-Business." Recently, our Chapter had the opportunity to participate in a "C2C" exchange...more specifically 503C-to-503C. First a little history. John Golgo, a Chapter member who lives up in Portland, contacted me and said that he had been visiting the Pearson Air Museum and discovered an abandoned Zenith 701project. John took the initiative to immediately contact me and provided me the name of the Museum Trust Manager. The Museum was only interested in donating this project to another 503C non-profit. It took less than an hour on the phone, we had completed a verbal agreement for EAA 292 to accept this project. Thanks to John for having his eyes open and understanding that this was a great opportunity for the Chapter.

Ernie Moreno got involved and made a trip up to Vancouver to check out the project. While he was there, he uncovered an opportunity for our Chapter to also receive multiple sets of steel shelving and file cabinets. Ernie made arrangement to return with two trailers and trucks!



At the May meeting, Dr. Steve Vets gave a presentation about how to get started in aerobatics. He included his Rx (prescription) for learning Acro. What I took away from the discussion was that while aerobatics is challenging and a lot of fun, having some basic aerobatic skill will make you a much safer pilot. From my perspective, taking a few unusual attitude and aerobatic lessons has helped me overcome most pilot's inherent fear of the spin/stall. Granted, it won't help you if you are flying at a low altitude. But this type of experience is something that every pilot should include in their training regimen.

#### Jabiru Engine Clinic submitted by Dave Ullman

On May 17-18 EAA 292 hosted a class on Jabiru engine maintenance. Pete Kortje, Mr. Jabiru US, came from Texas to

teach the class. There were 19 attendees from as far away as Sacramento California and Sequim Washington. Four EAA 292 members attended. This class came about because one member wanted a course on Jabiru engines without the need to travel to Texas or Tennessee. We were able to organize it through EAA 292 and the chapter made money doing it. Our new room layout and large screen TV worked well. EAA 292 received many complements on out facility and activities. If you have need for similar courses let the board know, but also be prepared to put in some of the effort needed to make it come off.



#### **EAA 292 Gifts and Endowments**

Four members have talked to the board about making endowments to EAA292. These and other gifts can help provide scholarships, flight training and facilities for the chapter into the future. The board is working with EAA national to put together a "how to" booklet that will explain the options to you. It will explain how to earmark funds for specific uses, how to get the maximum tax benefits from gifts and endowments and how to work with your financial advisor or attorney to leave an aviation legacy to EAA 292.

The reasons we are working with EAA national on this are: 1) The board does not have the expertise to manage your legacy. Further, we need to ensure that future boards invest it wisely. EAA National has a professional investment team that has gotten good return on their endowment in the past. 2) EAA National has a large endowment itself. By pooling our moneys with theirs we will get a better rate of return. 3) We will retain control of use of the moneys within the guideline defined by you, the donor, while not being responsible for our ability to make professional investment decisions.

EAA national does not currently have such a program to help chapters set up endowments. EAA 292 is assisting them in developing this program and the "how to" booklet. This is self-serving as we are helping them determine what is best for our chapter and our members. 
